



Nearly 500 APA members won trips to Vegas to compete in this year's 9-Ball Shootout. More than \$225,000 in cash and prizes was up for grabs in four Skill Level Tiers. After 48 hours of tournament competition, just eight players remained.

The champion in each tier would be rewarded with \$10,000 in cash and prizes, but to take home the top prize, one final challenge remained. With trophies and oversized prize checks in view, and cameras rolling, four title matches would be decided.



This year's Poolplayer Championships kicked off with the 8-Ball Classic. The event featured five Skill Level Tiers competing for more than \$375,000 in cash and prizes. Nearly 6,000 APA members competed in Regional competition for the 8-Ball Classic with 692 winning trips to advance to Las Vegas.

After two full days of competition, the action moved into the PoolDawg Championship Arena for the semifinal and final round of each Skill Level Tier.



Don't Let Your Team Become a DQ Statistic!

THE APA HANDICAP SYSTEM

When a team that has advanced into a prize money bracket at an APA Championship event is disqualified, one of the penalties is the forfeiture of their prize money. Forfeited prize money is then distributed to the teams that were eliminated by the disqualified team earlier in the competition. In addition, all teams eliminated by the disqualified team are reviewed and considered for an invitation to compete in the following year's Championship tournament.

In any sport that uses a handicap system, there are always people who try to manipulate the system in order to gain an unfair advantage over their opponent. Commonly referred to as sandbagging, this unethical practice of deliberately playing below your ability to keep your skill level down is better described as cheating. Plain and simple, that's what it is.

APA League's handicap and scoring system, *The Equalizer*_®, contains a number of anti-sandbagging measures, but it all starts with proper scorekeeping. The importance

of proper scorekeeping, which includes identifying and correctly marking Defensive Shots, cannot be stressed enough. In fact, not marking Defensive Shots properly is the number one reason teams get disqualified during the World Qualifiers and World Pool Championships.

It's important to remember that in order for sandbagging to take place, both players and teams must fail to follow the rules. The shooter must deliberately cheat, and the opponent must fail to properly mark the scoresheet. If scores are properly marked initially, there'd be no successful sandbagging, and disqualification wouldn't be necessary. Keep in mind, marking Defensive Shots does not affect the honest player. Be wary of players who argue against marking Defensive Shots!

So what exactly is a defensive shot? The APA's Official Team Manual states, "A Defensive Shot is a shot where there is no intent on the part of the shooter to pocket a ball of their category (8-Ball), or pocket any ball after contacting the lowest numbered

ball on the table (9-Ball)." Think of it this way—anytime you're not playing offense, you're playing defense. If you're trying to pocket your object ball, you're playing offense. Any other shot is a Defensive Shot and should be marked as such on the scoresheet. Yes, it's really that simple. And every year teams lose thousands of dollars because they're disqualified over something that simple.

To help educate teams and players, APA created a series of videos on understanding Defensive Shots and proper scorekeeping. These videos can be found at **youtube.com/apaleagues** and are a must-see for every APA member! It just might save your team from a disqualification.

No one likes disqualifying a team at the World Qualifiers or World Pool Championships. However, it's important for each team to have a fair chance of winning, and sometimes disqualifying a team is necessary to protect the honest teams, which make up the majority of the field, and the integrity of the event itself.

REMEMBER: Proper Scorekeeping = Accurate Handicapping = Fair Play

For the Love of the Game...

Win or Lose—Always Be a Good Sportsman!

GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP

What does it mean to be a good sportsman? Merriam-Webster defines "sportsman" as, "a person who shows sportsmanship". Fair enough, but what does it mean to show sportsmanship? Another glance at Merriam-Webster and we see that "sportsmanship" is defined as, "conduct (as fairness, respect for one's opponent and graciousness in winning or losing) becoming to one participating in a sport".

Now we're getting somewhere—fairness, respect for one's opponent and graciousness in winning or losing. How many times have you played a team that exemplified those characteristics? And, how many times have you played a team that didn't? Which team would you rather play? And more importantly, which team are you on?

Good manners are essential for all competitive sports; sportsmanship is at the very heart of APA League play. Congratulating your opponent when he makes a good shot and celebrating with your opponent when he wins adds character to the game. Keep proper score, shake hands, give high fives, smile and talk friendly to your opponent and the opposing teams. All of these subtle acts encourage sportsmanship—and you'll have more fun as you play each week.

Have Fun. Meet People. Play Pool. —that's what APA is all about. The League was founded on the premise of offering amateur poolplayers the opportunity to get together with friends, family and co-workers each week for a fun, friendly and relaxing time playing pool. When opponents show good sportsmanship, everybody has a good time—win or lose!

APA Recognizes TOP LEAGUE OPERATORS

APA recognized their top franchisees with League Operator of the Year awards during its annual League Operator Convention in late April. The five winners were selected from a group of nearly 300 APA League Operators throughout North America, with one League Operator selected from each market size.

In the Level 1 Market, Rob Ahne of the Southern Illinois APA was selected as League Operator of the Year. Ewa and Mitch Laurance, and their partners, Nikki and Toby Graham, of the Coastal Carolina APA were the top League Operators in the Level 2 Market. In the Level 3 Market, Skip & Joyce Lassiter of the Birmingham APA were selected League Operators of the Year for the third consecutive year. Rob and Jennifer Miller, and their partner, Dan Simning, of the River Valley APA in Pennsylvania were selected in the Level 4 Market. Matt Gillespie of the Central Indiana APA was awarded League Operator of the Year in the Level 5 Market.

APA awards a number of League Operators each year for their accomplishments in running their League area. Those selected as League Operator of the Year receive \$1,000 and a trophy.


In addition to recognizing the League Operators of the Year, APA also awarded the Rookie and Journeyman of the Year awards. Ashley and Kevin Morgan of the Lake and Osceola APA in Florida won the Rookie of the Year Award, while Don Ward of the Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill APA in North Carolina was selected for the Journeyman of the Year Award. The Journeyman of the Year is presented to the top League Operator who is no longer a rookie, but not yet eligible to receive the League Operator of the Year award.

APA President Terry Bell also named long-time League Operators Bruce and Ann Barthelette of the Connecticut APA as winners of the APA Lifetime Achievement Award. The Lifetime Achievement Award is presented annually for outstanding career achievements over 20 years or more.

The three-day conference, held at the Westgate Resort & Casino in Las Vegas, concluded with a formal reception where the winners were announced. This year's event also served as a celebration of APA's 40th Anniversary.



Lower Skilled Players—Qualify Now!

In the APA, *Everyone Can Play—Anyone Can Win!* If you're a lower skilled player, you have a great chance of qualifying for the Poolplayer Championships. In 2019, just 54 players competed in the Blue Tier (skill levels 2-3) of the 8-Ball Classic and only 59 competed in the Green Tier (skill levels 1-3) of the 9-Ball Shootout. Those are great odds! Here's what's up for grabs:

- \$15,000 cash and prize package awarded to each winner in the 8-Ball Classic and \$10,000 cash and prize package awarded to each champion in the 9-Ball Shootout.

The qualifying window for the 2020 Poolplayer Championships closes on Nov. 30. Players must qualify locally to advance to the Regional Level of competition. Winners at the Regional Level receive complimentary single occupancy lodging and travel assistance to the Championships in Las Vegas! 

Improving Your Game with Bruce Barthelette



Bruce Barthelette, "The Big Guy", is a professional poolplayer, and one of the top 10 trick shot players in the world. He has appeared on ESPN over 10 times, including the most recent World Cup of Trickshots tournament. He has played with Jeanette Lee, aka "The Black Widow", Mike Massey, Andy Segal, and Tom Rossman, among other top professionals in the game. He also played with Ewa Laurance and Allison Fisher, two members of the BCA Billiard Hall of Fame.

Bruce, along with his wife Ann, has run the second largest APA Pool League for over 20 years. With more than 6,000 players in the League, the APA of Connecticut is second only to Maryland. Bruce Barthelette's book, "Pool & Billiards," is available on Amazon.com.



BREAKING

Breaking is an important aspect of the game and gives you a competitive edge

A good break can give you an advantage over your opponent. Many players strive to make balls on the break so they can take control of the table. Making a ball on the break may also be the start of a break-and-run.

It is possible to win the game on the break when you make the 8-ball on the break without scratching. However, if you make the 8-on-the-break, and the cue ball scratches, then you lose the game. So you want to be careful when trying out this break.

Although it's possible to make an 8-onthe-break from multiple breaking positions, you will increase your chances when you use the position most recommended by the pros.

You can use several positions from which to break. You should try out different positions to find your comfort zone. You also want to optimize your chances to make balls on the break.

Professional players rarely break from straight on with the rack. The cue ball is often placed to either side of the center anywhere from 1/2 to 1^{1/2} diamonds over. The breaking area often referred to as "the kitchen" is from behind an imaginary line that goes across the table from the second diamond up. The cue ball will have more momentum striking the rack if you place it closer to that line.

Break Position for 8-on-the-Break



- You will impress your friends and win more games if you can make an 8-ball on the break.
- The best position to make the 8-on-the-break is with the cue ball about one ball away from either of the side rails.
- Bridge your hand on the side rail for more stability in your stroke.
- Place the cue ball within a comfortable distance near the second diamond.

Common Break Position



- A good break makes the balls scatter apart as much as possible. When the cue ball is closer to the rack, it will strike with more speed.
- Place the cue ball near the line at the second diamond up and about one-half diamond to either side of the center.
- Bridge your hand on the table behind the cue ball.
- Try breaking from different positions to find out where you get the best results.

Cue Ball Contact Point for 8-on-the-Break



- Aim for a full hit on the second ball while just barely missing the lead ball.
- Use low inside English on the cue ball to avoid a scratch.
- If you hit the ball too thin or without English on the cue ball, you may scratch.
- Practice this break for best results. The balls will spread out nicely, and your chances of making an 8-ball on the break will increase.

Cue Ball Contact Point on Common Break



- When breaking near the middle of the table, you should aim for a full hit on the head ball in the rack and use a center ball hit on the cue ball.
- Doing this will transfer more energy into the rack, causing the balls to spread out more.
- Remember to follow through on your break. Your chances of making a ball on the break will increase.
- Doing this will also give you an opportunity to get a good run after the break.



TRICK SHOTS BY DR. CUE

Tom "Dr. Cue" Rossman has been performing trick-shot exhibitions for over 30 years. He has won numerous awards, including the World Masters Trick Shot Competition, the North American Professional Trick and Fancy Championship, the World Artistic Championship, the ESPN Trick Shot Magic Event, and the WPA World Draw Shots Discipline. He is known as the Doctor of Billiardology. He currently does trick-shot exhibitions throughout the U.S., performing in college, military, corporate, mall, prison, billiard and special event arenas. Dr. Cue has agreed to give APA members a special look at how he performs some of his favorite trick-shots.

3 Balls, 3 Pockets & 3 Cushions!


SETUP/POSITION: 1-ball slightly left and 1 inch out from pocket BC; 2-ball frozen to 1-ball and aim setup line for (1) - (2) is to left center of TC; 3-ball on center edge of pocket TR; Cue ball 1 diamond segment back of 2-ball and in a straight line with 2-ball as you stand behind it. Maintain good fundamental form! DOUBLE CHECK SETUP!

BALL(S) POCKETED/OBJECTIVE: Shoot cue ball (c) to aim point (a) on 2-ball. 1-ball will drop in BC, 2-ball will travel to BL and drop, and cue ball will travel to (r) on #1 cushion and make 2 more cushion contacts on head and #3 before making 3-ball in pocket TR.

ADJUSTMENT ANALYSIS: If 1-ball and/or 2-ball does not go in, recheck setup and adjust as follows: 1) setup line for (1) - (2) adjusted to right slightly if 2-ball hits too much of cushion #3, and to the left slightly if 2-ball hits head cushion. If cue ball does not make 3-ball in TR at (h), adjust toward TL with cue ball contact (r) by making a thinner hit on 2-ball or applying a fraction more english — this is of course, if cue ball hits cushion #2 and 3rd contact at #3 cushion. If cue ball hits foot cushion after kick, adjust to TC or make fuller hit on 2-ball. You might also try a little more high english, and less sidespin.

DEGREE OF DIFFICULTY: 2.9

CONFIDENCE 5 minutes, 48 seconds **FACTOR:** per day for 3 days



2 Plus 2 — For You!


SETUP/POSITION: 4-ball on foot spot; 3-ball frozen to 4-ball and setup aim line to right edge of BR as we stand behind setup; Cue ball in straight line to 3-ball and on the straight line created by 1 diamond to left of TC and 1 diamond left of BC; 1-ball frozen to (c) aimed to left edge of TC and 2-ball frozen to (c) aimed to right edge of BC (toward BL). DOUBLE CHECK SETUP!

BALL(S) POCKETED/OBJECTIVE: Cue ball is aimed to (a) and shot straight with cue extension — 1-ball in TC, 2-ball in BC, 3-ball in TR, and 4-ball in BR. Cue ball must not scratch and end up on foot half of table for shot to count. (Right of dash line — foot spot to foot rail.)

ADJUSTMENT ANALYSIS: If 3-ball or 4-ball does not go in adjust throw setup line accordingly — if 4-ball hits right of BR, adjust setup line left slightly, and vice-versa; If 1-ball hits to left of TC, adjust setup line to right, and if it hits to right, adjust left. For 2-ball, if it hits to the left of BC as you are standing behind shot, adjust right, and if its hits right, adjust left. Make sure all balls are frozen! If cue ball does not hit aim (a) squarely, recheck follow-through for accuracy and speed — REACH OUT...STRAIGHT! If you scratch or lose control of cue ball, practice, practice, practice...
